The primary focus of this course is the Bronze Age in Anatolia, though it will also briefly outline preceding developments and the transition to the Early Iron Age. The introductory lecture will provide an overview of the history of research, as well as the geography, natural resources, and regional divisions of Anatolia. The course will cover the development of material culture and art, always in the broader context of societal and cultural transformations. Special attention will be given to interactions with neighbouring regions and the distinctions between Western, Central, and Eastern Anatolia.

6. The Late Bronze Age in Central Anatolia – Hittite Civilization I
7. The Late Bronze Age in Central Anatolia – Hittite Civilization II
8. The Late Bronze Age in Western Anatolia I
9. The Late Bronze Age in Western Anatolia II
10. The Early Iron Age in Western and Central Anatolia
